

STRATEGY MANAGEMENT OF 'KOPWAN' AS AN ULTRA-MICRO FINANCE SOLUTION FROM ONLINE LOANS

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Abstract

Indonesia's Women's Cooperative (KOPWAN) plays a vital role in empowering women through ultra-micro financing solutions. However, KOPWAN faces significant sustainability challenges, particularly competition with unregistered online loans. While KOPWAN provides more affordable financing access and skill training programs, limitations in capital and a lack of technological understanding among members represent weaknesses that need to be addressed. Conversely, there are opportunities for collaboration with formal financial institutions and government support for cooperatives that can enhance KOPWAN's capacity. The threats posed by intense competition and the risk of loan defaults must also be considered. By leveraging existing strengths and opportunities while addressing weaknesses and threats, KOPWAN can continue to contribute to women's empowerment and improve economic welfare in Indonesia. This research aims to analyze the sustainability challenges faced by KOPWAN and provide strategic recommendations to enhance the effectiveness of women's empowerment programs in the future.

Abstrak

Koperasi Wanita Indonesia (KOPWAN) memainkan peran penting dalam memberdayakan perempuan melalui solusi pembiayaan ultra mikro. Namun, KOPWAN menghadapi tantangan keberlanjutan yang signifikan, terutama persaingan dengan pinjaman online yang tidak terdaftar. Meskipun KOPWAN menyediakan akses pembiayaan yang lebih terjangkau dan program pelatihan keterampilan, keterbatasan modal dan kurangnya pemahaman teknologi di antara para anggotanya merupakan kelemahan yang perlu diatasi. Sebaliknya, ada peluang untuk berkolaborasi dengan lembaga keuangan formal dan dukungan pemerintah untuk koperasi yang dapat meningkatkan kapasitas KOPWAN. Dengan memanfaatkan kekuatan dan peluang yang ada serta mengatasi kelemahan dan ancaman yang ada, KOPWAN dapat terus berkontribusi

pada pemberdayaan perempuan dan meningkatkan kesejahteraan ekonomi di Indonesia. Penelitian ini bertujuan untuk menganalisis tantangan keberlanjutan yang dihadapi oleh KOPWAN dan memberikan rekomendasi strategis untuk meningkatkan efektivitas program pemberdayaan perempuan di masa depan.

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1. INTRODUCTION

The role of financial institutions in the economy is crucial as they serve as intermediaries that connect those with surplus funds to those in need of financing. Financial institutions not only function as places for money storage but also act as engines for economic growth through the provision of credit, investment, and various other financial services.

Globally, data indicates that there remains a gap in access to banking services between men and women, particularly in developing countries. According to the World Bank's Global Findex report, while the ownership of bank accounts continues to rise among women, they still tend to have more limited access compared to men regarding credit, investment, and other financial services.

In several banking sectors, such as micro-savings and group-based financial services, women often constitute the majority of clients. This is because women are more likely to save for family needs, children's education, and small businesses. Additionally, many inclusive finance programs specifically target women, such as micro-enterprise loans, which have increased the number of women utilizing banking services.

Women choose bank credit for various reasons related to economic needs, security, and accessibility. One of the primary reasons is business capital, as many women use credit to start or expand small and medium enterprises, which often serve as the main source of income for their families. Furthermore, banks offer more competitive interest rates and flexible repayment schemes compared to informal financial institutions or loan sharks, providing a sense of security in debt management.

increasing debt burden if not managed properly. Many online loans impose short repayment periods, thereby increasing the risk of default and accumulating penalties.

The role of *Koperasi Wanita* (KOPWAN) in Indonesia is crucial for empowering women through ultra-micro financing solutions. However, KOPWAN faces significant sustainability challenges, particularly from competition with unregistered online loans. While KOPWAN provides more affordable financing access and skill training programs, limitations in capital and a lack of technological understanding among its members represent weaknesses that need to be addressed Nurpramana (2024).

The security of personal data is a significant concern in online lending. Many platforms request access to personal data on mobile phones, such as contacts and

photo galleries, which can be misused in the event of payment delays. Some illegal loans employ intimidation tactics or the dissemination of personal information to pressure borrowers into repaying their debts promptly Wahyuni (2021).

Not all online loans are supervised by the Financial Services Authority (OJK) or other official institutions. Borrowers who are less careful in choosing service providers can fall victim to illegal lending practices that lack clear regulations and are difficult to report when violations occur (Marino & Gunawan, 2021). The lack of financial education poses a challenge, as many individuals apply for online loans without fully understanding the terms and conditions, potentially trapping them in a cycle of debt that is hard to escape. As of 2023, the OJK and the Task Force for the Eradication of Illegal Financial Activities (Satgas PASTI) have blocked numerous illegal online loans, although the exact number may vary (Maivalinda, 2023).

As a solution for women needing ultra-micro financial support, the emergence of financial institutions specifically for women presents a safer and more sustainable alternative compared to online loans (pinjol). These financial institutions offer lower interest rates, flexible payment schemes, and financial education and mentoring programs, which help women manage their loans more effectively (Firmansyah et al., 2021). As of April 2018, the number of women's cooperatives in Indonesia was approximately 13,000 units (Nurjanah, 2024).

Women-specific cooperatives are designed to support economic empowerment, especially for women who wish to start or expand small and medium enterprises (SMEs). With a group-based lending system or social guarantees, women can access financing without facing the risks of high interest rates and unethical collection practices often found in illegal online loans (Nihayah et al., 2023). Women's cooperatives are currently developing as an inclusive financial solution aimed at enhancing the welfare and economic independence of women, particularly those involved in the SME sector (Jusriadi, 2024).

According to data from the Central Statistics Agency (BPS), in 2021, there were approximately 1,300 registered women's cooperatives in Indonesia, with more than 70% operating in the micro and small sectors (Sasongko, 2023) (Hasibuan et al., 2022). However, despite the significant number of women's cooperatives, many face difficulties in accessing capital and maintaining competitiveness. Data shows that only about 30% of women's cooperatives can provide loans to their members at competitive interest rates compared to online loans (Muryani et al., 2020; Muryani et al., 2020).

Online loans have become an attractive alternative for many micro and small enterprises, especially in rural areas. According to a report from the Financial Services Authority (OJK), the total loans disbursed by online loan providers reached IDR 50 trillion in 2022, with an annual growth rate of 25% (Zubaidah et al., 2022; Zubaidah et al., 2022; . This indicates that online loans have become the primary choice for many micro-entrepreneurs who need quick access to capital. KOPWAN needs to adapt to these changes to remain relevant and competitive.

Data from a survey conducted by BPS indicates that about 45% of the public is still hesitant to use online loan services due to concerns about high interest rates and aggressive collection risks (Bagaskara, 2024) (Agustina et al., 2022). KOPWAN can take advantage of this situation by offering more transparent and ethical products, as

well as providing education to members on sound financial management. KOPWAN must also pay attention to sustainability aspects in their operations. According to research by Handayani and Lestari, cooperatives that implement principles of accountability and transparency in financial reporting tend to be more successful in attracting new members (Handayani & Lestari, 2020) (Darusman, 2023).

In terms of regulation, the Indonesian government has made efforts to enhance financial inclusion through various programs, including ultra-micro financing. Unfortunately, many challenges remain, including regulations that hinder access to financing for micro and small enterprises. According to BPS data, about 60% of micro-enterprises in Indonesia still rely on informal financing sources, such as loan sharks, due to a lack of access to formal financial institutions (Sasongko, 2023) (Hasibuan et al., 2022). KOPWAN needs to play an active role in advocating for policies that support access to financing for its members.

KOPWAN must also adapt to technological developments. The use of digital platforms to facilitate loans and financial management can help KOPWAN improve operational efficiency and expand their reach. Data shows that the use of technology in the financial sector can enhance access to financial services for previously underserved communities (Zubaidah et al., 2022; (Zubaidah et al., 2022; .

One strategy that KOPWAN can implement is to increase financial literacy among its members. According to research by Sasongko, a better understanding of financial products can help members make better decisions regarding loans and investments (Sasongko, 2023) (Hasibuan et al., 2022). KOPWAN can organize training and workshops to enhance members' knowledge about financial management and prudent investing.

KOPWAN also needs to consider the social impact of their activities. According to research by Bashir et al., online loans often come with high risks that can burden borrowers (Bashir et al., 2022) (Desmintari & Aryani, 2021). KOPWAN must ensure that the products they offer are not only financially beneficial but also consider the welfare of their members.

In facing sustainability challenges, KOPWAN must continue to innovate and adapt to market changes. According to research by Prihatini, micro enterprises that can adapt to environmental changes can enhance their competitiveness (Prihatini, 2023) (Zubaidah et al., 2022). KOPWAN needs to develop products and services that align with market needs and current trends to remain relevant.

KOPWAN can also leverage networks and collaborations with other organizations to enhance their sustainability. According to research by Abdullah and Susanto, collaboration between financial institutions and micro enterprises can improve access to financing and strengthen the bargaining position of micro-enterprises in the market (Abdullah & Susanto, 2019) (Wetina et al., 2021). KOPWAN can establish partnerships with government agencies, non-governmental organizations, and the private sector to create an ecosystem that supports micro-enterprise sustainability.

The importance of performance measurement should also be considered by KOPWAN. According to research by Thaker and Thaker, good performance measurement can help KOPWAN evaluate the effectiveness of programs and strategies implemented (Thaker & Thaker, 2019) (Rakhmawati, 2023). By collecting

and analyzing performance data, KOPWAN can make better decisions and enhance their sustainability.

KOPWAN must also pay attention to the specific needs of its members. According to research by Hanim, a better understanding of member needs can help KOPWAN design more suitable and appealing products for members (Hanim, 2023) (Istifadhoh et al., 2021). By conducting surveys and market research, KOPWAN can identify member needs and develop products that meet those needs. KOPWAN is one of the ultra-micro finance (UMi) institutions that play a vital role in empowering the economic capacity of communities that lack access to formal financial services. By providing very small loans, this scheme helps individuals and ultra-micro enterprises, such as street vendors and small farmers, to obtain capital without relying on loan sharks. Its simpler and more flexible process allows it to meet both business needs and necessities such as education and health. Furthermore, nanofinance also contributes to increasing financial inclusion by opening opportunities for marginalized communities to build a credit history that can lead them to larger financial services in the future.

In several countries, Women's Ultra-Micro Finance (UMi) has received special attention from government and non-governmental organizations in the form of business mentoring programs, financial literacy training, as well as access to markets and digital technology. In Indonesia, women's cooperatives serve as a tool for empowering women, the majority of whom are farmers and agricultural laborers. KOPWAN focuses on group-based financing, where members support each other in managing their loans and businesses. This model assists women who struggle to access conventional bank credit due to limitations in collateral or credit history.

This research will discuss the following:

1. How is the resilience analysis of KOPWAN in the face of rampant online loans?
2. What programs does KOPWAN offer as solutions for women's empowerment today?

2. LITERATURE REVIEW

Women's cooperatives in Indonesia have become important pillars in the development of local economies and the empowerment of women. In this context, women's cooperatives function not only as economic institutions but also as platforms to improve the quality of life of their members through various programs and activities. Research indicates that women's cooperatives can significantly contribute to the economic well-being of women, particularly in rural areas and low-income communities (Suseno & Nataliningsih, 2023; Hendratmi et al., 2022).

Adkins and Smith (2019) discuss the role of women's cooperatives in enhancing economic empowerment across various countries. This study employs a comparative approach by analyzing data from several developing and developed countries to explore how women's cooperatives can increase income, economic independence, and social welfare among their members. Through both qualitative and quantitative methods, the research highlights key factors contributing to the success of women's cooperatives, including access to financial resources, government policy support, and active member participation in decision-making processes (Jayawardena & Rathnasiri, 2019). The findings reveal that women's cooperatives in developing

countries focus more on poverty reduction and job access for low-income women, while in developed countries, the emphasis is on strengthening economic positions and reducing gender gaps in business leadership (Ekadinata et al., 2023).

Ali and Sulaiman (2018) examine the role of women's cooperatives in promoting rural development in Indonesia. The study underscores how these cooperatives contribute to economic empowerment, social inclusion, and community development. Key findings indicate that women's cooperatives provide financial resources, training, and market access, enabling rural women to start and expand their businesses. Additionally, they foster social cohesion and improve household welfare by increasing income and decision-making power among women. The research concludes that strengthening women's cooperatives through policy support and capacity-building initiatives can significantly enhance rural development outcomes in Indonesia (Suseno & Nataliningsih, 2023; Hendratmi et al., 2022).

An article by Osei and Quansah (2019) investigates the impact of women's cooperatives on household income in rural Ghana. The results show that participation in women's cooperatives significantly increases household income through better access to credit, skills training, and market opportunities. Furthermore, cooperatives help improve financial stability and the well-being of members by providing social and economic support networks. The study also highlights challenges faced, such as limited capital and lack of advanced training. The authors suggest that policies supporting the strengthening of women's cooperatives could further enhance their positive impact on rural economic development in Ghana (Jayawardena & Rathnasiri, 2019).

One of the main challenges faced by women's cooperatives is financing. Women's cooperatives often struggle to access the necessary capital to operate and develop their businesses. Research indicates that applying the 7C principles (character, capital, capacity, collateral, economic conditions, constraints, and coverage) can help mitigate financing issues in women's cooperatives. By implementing these principles, cooperatives can enhance trust in financial institutions and expand access to funding sources (Hendratmi et al., 2022).

In addition to financing issues, the quality of cooperative management is also a crucial factor in the success of women's cooperatives. Mulyani emphasizes the importance of improving the quality of managers and the number of members in the Penanggungjan Women's Cooperative in Malang City to enhance the competitiveness of the cooperative Tena (2024). Training and development programs for cooperative managers can help improve managerial and operational skills, which in turn will positively impact the cooperative's performance.

Women's cooperatives also play a role in enhancing the skills of their members, particularly in financial management. Hetika et al. demonstrate that training in preparing financial reports using Microsoft Excel can improve transparency and accountability in cooperative management (Khadka, 2024). With better financial management skills, cooperative members can better understand the financial condition of the cooperative and contribute to more informed decision-making.

The importance of halal certification for products produced by women's cooperatives cannot be overlooked. Zuchrillah et al. investigate the halal certification program for SMEs fostered by the Setia Bhakti Wanita Cooperative in Surabaya,

showing that halal certification can enhance product competitiveness in the market (Aziz, 2024). By obtaining halal certification, products from women's cooperatives can be more accepted by consumers, especially in markets sensitive to halal issues.

Women's cooperatives also serve as a means to empower women in entrepreneurship. Sudrajat and Khoiri analyze the health of women's cooperatives in Madiun City, indicating that healthy cooperatives can have a positive impact on women's economic empowerment (Saefullah, 2023). Well-managed cooperatives not only provide access to capital but also create business opportunities for their members.

However, the success of women's cooperatives is closely tied to government support and favorable regulations. Hariwibowo and Puteri stress that good government regulations can encourage the sustainability of cooperative businesses (Abiola et al., 2021). Therefore, the government needs to create policies that support the development of cooperatives, including women's cooperatives, to operate effectively and efficiently.

In today's digital era, the utilization of information technology is also crucial for women's cooperatives. Sonoto examines how internet penetration can enhance the implementation of Annual Member Meetings (RAT) and the business volume of cooperatives (Rahmi et al., 2023). By leveraging technology, women's cooperatives can improve operational efficiency and expand their market reach.

Women's cooperatives must also face challenges regarding public perception, particularly among the millennial generation. Sholihah finds that the interest of millennials in joining cooperatives is still low, indicating the need for more effective marketing strategies to attract their interest (Setyanto, 2024). Cooperatives need to adopt more innovative approaches that resonate with the needs of younger generations to attract new members.

In the context of community economic empowerment, women's cooperatives also play a role in enhancing family economic independence. Rakhmawati investigates the influence of financial ratios on the financial performance of the Nusa Indah Women's Cooperative, showing that good financial performance can enhance the cooperative's ability to provide loans to its members (Svetlicinii, 2018). Thus, women's cooperatives can assist their members in developing businesses and increasing income.

Women's cooperatives also have the potential to contribute to local economic development. Mahendrawati et al. demonstrate that community partnership programs can increase awareness among cooperative members and managers about the long-term potential of cooperatives (Suharni & Rochman, 2020). By enhancing understanding of cooperative potential, members can become more actively involved in cooperative activities and support business development.

The importance of good bookkeeping in cooperatives cannot be ignored. Rufaidah et al. emphasize that proper bookkeeping can improve the performance of cooperative members (Chivundu-Ngulube & Li, 2019). By understanding the significance of bookkeeping, cooperative managers and members can take more responsibility in financial management and enhance transparency in cooperative operations.

Women's cooperatives can also address social issues such as unemployment and poverty. Purbowati and Nurhayati show that cooperatives can function as institutions

that help communities meet their economic needs (Wascher et al., 2019). By providing access to capital and training, women's cooperatives can assist their members in creating jobs and improving living standards.

To enhance competitiveness, women's cooperatives need to innovate in the products and services they offer. Dihastuti investigates the importance of innovation in the products produced by the Kenanga Women's Cooperative in Madiun (Khadka, 2024). By innovating, cooperatives can attract more customers and increase revenue.

3. DISCUSSION

A. Sustainability Challenge Of KOPWAN As An Ultra-Micro Finance Solution From Online Loans in Indonesia

Women's Cooperatives (KOPWAN) in Indonesia face significant sustainability challenges in the context of ultra-micro financing solutions, particularly in light of competition from online loans. In recent years, online lending has rapidly grown as an alternative financing option for micro and small enterprises, often accompanied by high risks such as exorbitant interest rates and unethical lending practices (Issundari (2024) Obianefo et al., 2021). According to data from the Financial Services Authority (OJK), by the end of 2022, the number of registered online lending providers reached 160, with total loans disbursed amounting to IDR 30 trillion. This indicates that despite the substantial potential in this sector, sustainability challenges for KOPWAN remain prevalent.

One of the primary challenges for KOPWAN is enhancing their competitiveness amidst the proliferation of online loans. KOPWAN needs to offer more attractive and sustainable products to attract new members and retain existing ones. According to Nurpramana, ultra-micro financing programs can help improve the welfare of debtors, but KOPWAN must adapt to the needs and expectations of their members (Hayati & Arini, 2023). This includes providing more flexible and transparent services regarding costs and loan terms.

Statistics show that many micro and small enterprises in Indonesia still rely on informal loans, such as from loan sharks, due to a lack of access to formal financial institutions. Data from Bank Indonesia indicates that approximately 60% of micro enterprises do not have access to formal financing (Andrew, 2024). KOPWAN can capitalize on this situation by offering more affordable financing products tailored to the needs of their members, as well as providing education on sound financial management.

KOPWAN must also pay attention to sustainability aspects in their operations. Research by Rudiningtyas indicates that green innovation can enhance the competitiveness and financial performance of micro and ultra-micro enterprises (Panjaitan, 2024). By adopting sustainable business practices, KOPWAN can not only improve its image in the eyes of members but also contribute to broader sustainable development goals.

The importance of collaboration between KOPWAN and formal financial institutions cannot be overlooked. KOPWAN can establish partnerships with Islamic banks and other financial institutions to improve members' access to financing. According to Hsb, Islamic financing can have a positive impact on the performance of

micro-enterprises, allowing KOPWAN to leverage this financing model to enhance their sustainability (Oruç et al., 2017).

In terms of regulation, the Indonesian government has made efforts to improve financial inclusion through various programs, including ultra-micro financing. However, many challenges remain, including regulations that hinder access to financing for micro and small enterprises. Research by Afkar suggests that more inclusive regulations are needed to support the growth of KOPWAN and other micro enterprises (Mattison et al., 2022).

KOPWAN must also adapt to technological advancements. The use of digital platforms to facilitate loans and financial management can help KOPWAN improve operational efficiency and expand its reach. Data shows that technology use in the financial sector can enhance access to financial services for previously underserved populations (Parker & Alstyne, 2018). Therefore, KOPWAN should consider investing in information technology to enhance their services.

According to research by Yasin, a better understanding of financial products can help members make more informed decisions regarding loans and investments (Sidiyanto, 2024). KOPWAN can organize training and workshops to enhance members' knowledge about financial management and prudent investing.

Women's Cooperatives (KOPWAN) play a crucial role as ultra-micro financial solutions for women in Indonesia, particularly in mitigating the negative impacts of the surge in online loans. As community-based institutions, KOPWAN offers more affordable financial access, with low-interest rates and a mutual assistance system that promotes member welfare. The resilience of KOPWAN in facing competition from online loans heavily depends on its ability to adapt to technological developments, enhance financial literacy among members, and strengthen regulations that protect cooperatives from unfair competition.

Women's Cooperatives (KOPWAN) have several advantages over online loans (pinjol), particularly in terms of sustainability and member welfare. First, the interest rates are lower because KOPWAN is oriented towards member welfare rather than profit alone, making repayments more affordable and less burdensome for borrowers. Second, the cooperative system fosters solidarity and support among members, contrasting with the more transactional and individual nature of online loans. Third, KOPWAN provides guidance and financial literacy, equipping its members with financial education, and enabling them to manage their finances more wisely. Fourth, the loan process is safer, as cooperatives operate under stricter and more transparent regulations compared to many illegal online lending platforms that often ensnare borrowers with high interest rates and unethical collection practices. Fifth, KOPWAN promotes sustainability and economic empowerment, as it not only assists in meeting short-term financial needs but also encourages women's economic independence through various savings programs and productive enterprises.

On the other hand, the existence of online loans in Indonesia has rapidly developed alongside the increasing demand for quick and easy financial access. The ease of application, instant fund disbursement, and minimal administrative requirements make online loans a primary choice for many individuals, especially those without access to formal banking. However, behind this convenience, online loans also present various challenges, such as high interest rates, aggressive collection practices, and the risk of excessive debt due to a lack of financial literacy. The proliferation of illegal online loans further exacerbates the situation, trapping many individuals in loan schemes with crippling interest rates and threats of personal data misuse. Although the government has attempted to regulate and oversee this industry through the Financial Services Authority (OJK) and the Investment Alert Task Force, online loans remain a difficult phenomenon to control.

The development of online loans in Indonesia has shown a significant trend in recent years. According to data from the Financial Services Authority (OJK), as of March 2024, the total loan disbursement through online lending platforms reached IDR 22.76 trillion, an increase of 8.89% compared to the previous month. The number of active borrowers has also risen. In December 2023, there were approximately 18.07 million active borrowers on online lending platforms, with the majority coming from Java Island, accounting for 73.34% of total borrowers. Many people in Indonesia choose online loans due to the ease of access and quick fund disbursement. The simple application process, requiring only an ID card and personal data without collateral, makes online loans the primary choice for those lacking access to formal banking. Additionally, the flexibility in loan amounts and payment terms attracts interest, especially among informal sector workers who struggle to obtain loans from banks or

cooperatives. Online loans are often used for urgent needs such as healthcare costs, education, or immediate daily necessities.

Women's cooperatives have been the subject of extensive research, highlighting their multifaceted roles in promoting economic empowerment, social inclusion, and gender equality. This comprehensive analysis delves into various studies to elucidate women's cooperatives' impacts, challenges, and potential across different contexts.

Research indicates that women-led cooperatives significantly contribute to poverty reduction. By providing members with access to financial resources, training, and markets, these cooperatives enable women to generate income and achieve economic independence. A report by the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) emphasizes that such cooperatives contribute to Sustainable Development Goals, including eliminating poverty and promoting economic growth.

Women's cooperatives play a crucial role in advancing gender equality. They offer platforms for women to assume leadership roles, thereby challenging traditional gender norms. A literature review by the International Labour Organization (ILO) found a growing attention to gender issues within cooperatives, with more women moving into leadership positions and the development of women-owned cooperatives.

Beyond economic benefits, women's cooperatives foster social cohesion and community development. They serve as support networks, providing members with a sense of belonging and collective identity. In Turkey, for instance, women's cooperatives have been instrumental in preventing poverty through collaborative efforts, turning individual labor into financial gain and strengthening solidarity among women.

Despite their benefits, women face several barriers to active participation and leadership in cooperatives. These include limited literacy and numeracy skills, discomfort with public speaking, time constraints due to family obligations, and societal perceptions that leadership roles are male domains. A report highlights these challenges, noting that they hinder women's full engagement in cooperative activities.

Studies have shown that participation in women's cooperatives positively impacts household income. By pooling resources and accessing larger markets, members can achieve better financial outcomes. For example, in Ghana, women's cooperatives have been associated with significant improvements in household income and overall economic well-being.

While cooperatives aim to promote gender equality, some studies suggest that merely participating in a cooperative does not automatically lead to significant improvements in gender relations. Deep-seated cultural norms and structural inequalities can persist, limiting the transformative potential of cooperatives. Therefore, intentional strategies are necessary to address these underlying issues.

Globally, there has been an increase in women's participation in cooperatives. An online survey conducted by the ILO and the International Co-operative Alliance revealed that 75% of respondents felt that women's participation in cooperatives had increased over the past 20 years. This trend reflects a growing recognition of the value women bring to cooperative enterprises.

Women's cooperatives operate across various sectors, including agriculture, crafts, and services. In agriculture, cooperatives have enabled women to access

resources, training, and markets, thereby enhancing productivity and income. In the crafts sector, cooperatives provide platforms for women artisans to collectively market their products, ensuring fair compensation and preserving cultural heritage.

Case Study: Self-Employed Women's Association (SEWA) in India. SEWA is a notable example of a successful women's cooperative. It has empowered thousands of self-employed women by providing access to financial services, training, and markets. SEWA's integrated approach addresses various aspects of women's lives, contributing to their economic and social empowerment.

The concept of data cooperatives is emerging as a means to empower women in the digital economy. By pooling data, women can enhance their collective bargaining power, improve access to credit, and protect their privacy. Existing women's cooperatives can integrate data pooling to derive additional value and prevent harm.

Some women's cooperatives are contributing to environmental sustainability by adopting eco-friendly practices. For instance, in central India, women involved in organic cotton farming have formed cooperatives to produce and sell biofertilizers and biopesticides, promoting sustainable agriculture and enhancing their livelihoods.

To maximize the impact of women's cooperatives, policy support and capacity-building initiatives are essential. Governments and development organizations can play a crucial role by providing funding, training, and creating an enabling environment for cooperatives to thrive. Such support can enhance the sustainability and scalability of women's cooperatives.

Despite their successes, many women's cooperatives face challenges in achieving financial sustainability. Limited access to capital, markets, and business development services can hinder their growth. Addressing these challenges requires targeted interventions to strengthen the financial base and operational capacities of cooperatives.

Women's cooperatives build social capital by fostering trust, reciprocity, and networks among members. This social capital can be leveraged to access resources, information, and support, further enhancing the effectiveness of cooperatives in achieving their objectives.

Participation in women's cooperatives has been linked to improved health and well-being. Through collective efforts, cooperatives can provide members with access to healthcare services, health education, and support systems, contributing to better health outcomes. Cooperatives often invest in the education and skill development of their members. By providing training in various domains, cooperatives enhance the human capital of women.

4. CONCLUSION

The sustainability challenges faced by Koperasi Wanita (KOPWAN) as an ultra-micro finance solution are multifaceted, particularly in the context of competition from unregistered online loans. KOPWAN plays a critical role in empowering women by providing access to affordable financing and skill development programs. However, the rapid growth of online lending platforms presents a significant threat, as these platforms often offer quicker access to funds, albeit at higher interest rates and risks Wahyuni (2020) Bashir et al., 2022).

Moreover, KOPWAN struggles with internal weaknesses, such as limited capital and a lack of technological understanding among its members, which hinder its ability to compete effectively (Nurpramana, 2024). To address these challenges, KOPWAN can leverage opportunities for collaboration with formal financial institutions and government support, which can enhance its operational capacity and outreach (Khar et al., 2019).

Additionally, the cooperative must adopt robust risk management strategies to mitigate the threats posed by intense competition and the potential for loan defaults (Prijadi et al., 2020). By focusing on strengthening its internal capabilities while capitalizing on external opportunities, KOPWAN can continue to contribute to women's empowerment and economic welfare in Indonesia, ensuring its sustainability in the face of evolving financial landscapes.

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
